1	During this observership, I learned about the structure of India's health care system and how it has been designed as a multi-tiered system in order to increase patient accessibility and affordability. While the theory behind the healthcare system in India is very well developed, the system is challenged by a lack of funding and overpopulation. Globally, the Kempegowda Institute is recognized for its expertise in rabies. The community medicine staff and faculty have been credited with reducing the annual caseload of rabies in India from ~20,000 to ~2,000 over the past two decades. Regarding tropical medicine, I was surprised to learn that India accounts for over half of the world's incidence of new leprosy cases each year. Other major infectious diseases and tropical illnesses seen in the hospital include tuberculosis, dengue fever, and malaria. 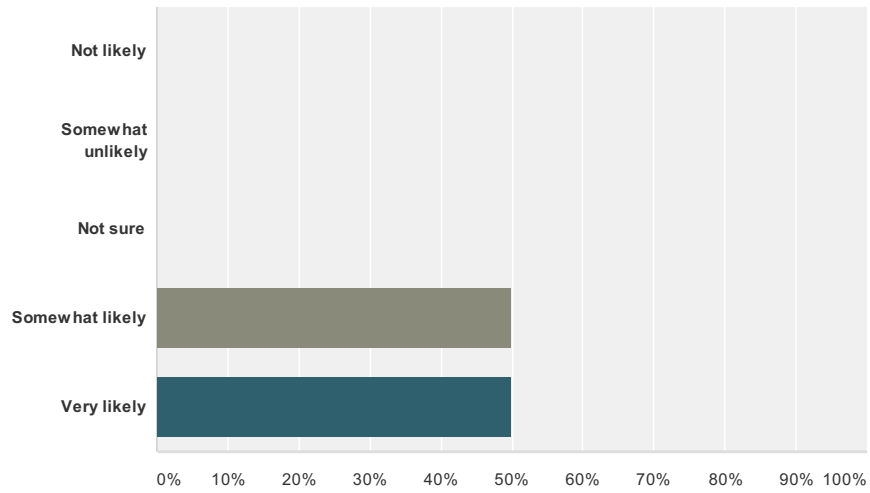

1	<p>India, a country with a population pushing 1.8 billion, utilizes a multi-tiered health system split between public and private sectors. The public health system accounts for ~20% of patient care in India. It is split into tertiary regional, secondary, and primary local hospitals and clinics, and primary clinics are further divided into community health access centers. The private health system accounts for the remaining ~80% of patient care and includes both private hospitals and university hospitals. University hospitals like the Kempegowda Institute of Medical Sciences function as a charity hospital in which private funding offsets the costs of patient care. Every medical school is required to have rural and urban health clinics in which students train for primary care rotations. Even if Indian health care hospitals and institutions don't share the same level of wealth as U.S. medical schools, the education is top-notch and the physicians and students are very knowledgeable and well prepared to deliver care.</p>	8/20/2014 11:01 AM

1	<p>In the future, I think students should approach this site in one of two ways. The first is as a student interested in a general learning observership. The observership is run by the community medicine department, and as such, the student should be interested in public health. The faculty mentor at KIMS should deliver a list of possible observership rotations at KIMS to the interested student well in advance of the elective dates (ideally). The student should then select up to three departments to observe (one week with each department). In its current design, this observership exposes students to learning in general medicine wards, emergency medicine, ICU, pulmonary and tuberculosis wards, HIV outpatient department, maternity and childcare, rural &amp; urban health posts, allergy &amp; immunizations, rabies clinic, and a leprosy hospital. While this setup provides a very well rounded look into the health system, it does not allow students to dive deeply into specific areas of medicine for a potentially richer experience. Therefore, I recommend that the student's experience be limited to 3 departments in the observership. The second way to approach this site is to come with a community medicine research project in mind. The faculty will be very adept in helping the student to set up the research project and carry it out. As a side note, KIMS has a great relationship with the National Institute of Mental Health and Neurological Sciences (NIMHANS), an internationally renowned research hospital, because of their work in rabies.
